
## BLONDIN CONSORTIUM

### Friends of Blondin Park

The Friends of Blondin Park group, which I chair, is a voluntary group set up in September 1998 to support the Council's Countryside Service in maintaining and developing the newly established Blondin Park Nature Reserve and the neighbouring Blondin Park. The nature area was established in 1997 on a former allotment site after local residents supported this use for the area. Nearly everything you see now in the reserve was introduced, including most of the trees, the wildflower meadow, the community orchard and the pond. The Friends group was able to apply for grants from the National Lottery and Green Corridor and considerable amounts were raised, which covered the installation of benches, paths, gates, decking round the pond, a welcome board and public art. Later in 1997 the Nature Reserve was formally opened and the park, formerly known as Northfield Recreation Ground, was officially renamed by the great-grandson of Charles Blondin, the famous French high-wire walker who lived near the site on his retirement. In 2001 the area was granted Local Nature Reserve status. Over the years, the Friends have held workdays on site with the Council Rangers, undertaking tasks ranging from clearing brambles, pruning and mulching the apple trees, clearing paths and litter-picking. They have also organised or been involved in

The park, which was once a fairly barren space of grass with a few trees dotted around and surrounded by a chain-link fence, is now transformed into an attractive wildlife-friendly green space, with a children's playground, adult gym equipment and a mini-MUGA (multi-use games area). In 2017, it was awarded a Green Flag followed by a second in 2018. However, there is more to be done: we are looking forward to being involved in further improvements to widen the use of the park, in particular enabling better use to be made of the sports field as part of the Blondin Consortium.

major planting events such as bulb, hedge and tree planting, in both the nature reserve and the park, as well as organising several very popular 'Blondin Days', now superseded by the Brentford Festival in Blondin. The group is also consulted by the Council

about developments being considered for the park and this is an important aspect of its role.





**Active Citizens in Parks** 

Our intention is to collaborate with residents, communities and businesses in a way that is sensitive to different neighbourhoods and interests, and capitalise on the rich assets and capabilities within the borough to strengthen citizens' capacity to help themselves and each other. This involves a culture shift within the council towards an enabling role and a willingness to put residents in control through mobilising peer to peer support. Our aim is to increase citizens' self-sufficiency and achieve improved outcomes whilst reducing unnecessary demand on public services.

**Footy Fun 4 Kids** has been running a very popular football club at Blondin Park for the last 4 years. We have engaged with over 1000 children since 2014, helping them to develop not only their football skills, but also their confidence and social skills. We are highly popular with local residents and have grown mainly through word of mouth.

We really care about the children we work with and their families, and would love to see the facilities at Blondin improve to benefit the local community. We feel it is very important that any development at Blondin Park retains a community feel, as the families that live in the area really care about where they live and what happens in the area.

We are excited to be involved in the process of developing the proposed site at Blondin Park. As sport is close to our hearts, we would love to see purpose built football pitches at Blondin Park, and also a running track, to encourage local residents in the community to engage in sport and physical activity. Toilets and changing rooms would also be highly beneficial to the site as it would help to increase the participation of sport and physical activity, as there would be more that could be offered from the site. For example, if toilets were to be present at Blondin, we would be able to offer full day school holiday clubs, which would be useful to local families. Lara and Chris Webb-Butler

Many individuals have had difficult experiences such as substance abuse, bereavement, family breakdown and prison to name a few. However, Saturday Football a time where they can escape these difficulties, switch off for a period of time and have fun.

We have seen some really positive changes among the individuals who have played at Saturday Football and the vision is to see Ealing continually develop. The Youth Engagement Programme is a grassed root organisation, it was established in May 2016 and gained its registered charity status in January 2017.

We work with young people on an individual and group basis often giving respite to them and their family. Each young person has their own tailored programme enabling them to engage into activities they have a passion for or just want to explore further.

The programme has been designed to help young people improve their chances of employment by offering them coaching support and bespoke activities in order to build skills and confidence and ultimately put them on the right path to a successful future.



We have created a number of social enterprise programmes where young people have taken the lead giving valuable work experience opportunities in different pathways as they transition into adulthood.

All those engaged with us have individual support plans, these are then used as tools to develop their skills and emotional wellbeing. Outcomes have included: better self-awareness, increased resilience, more motivation, higher aspirations as well as increased confidence, self-esteem and self-worth.

The young people we work with often have complex needs so being able to contribute to society is extremely important to them, we offer them an opportunity to start their journey of living a more useful life.

One of our working model is to give opportunities to young adults whose passion is to work with young people who may have a disability/additional needs by employing them to be developmental workers. It is not uncommon for us to be working with young people who do not have the social skills to build successful peer relationships especially those young people on the autistic spectrum, our model addresses this as our young adults are able to support them in building the skills to maintain appropriate relationships.

The potential of the Blondin Consortium is huge and we follow the desire to have a community building for our young people to show their skills. We envisage a Community Café run by us. We already make doggie treats, chocolate and jam and could facilitate children's parties in association with the football club therefore making the whole project more sustainable.
