<b>Purpose of Report:</b> To provide a brief analysis on the April 2014 – March 2015 provisional performance (2014/15 year) for looked after children and care leavers.	

## **1 Review of Performance Indicators for Children's Services**

### **Children & Families Performance Assessment Framework 2014/15**

1.1 The use of Performance Indicators (PIs) in assessing performance enables the council to evaluate its current performance, monitor improvements and inform service development. Performance is reviewed monthly by operational service management and by the departmental senior management team.

1.2 The external inspection and assessment of services lead by Ofsted uses the indicators as part of the evidence to inform their assessments of the councils' performance, as summarised in the annual performance ratings. These indicators, however, must be considered as part of a broader set of performance evidence including inspection and review, regular liaison and monitoring of services and the commissioning and delivery of services with partners, particularly with the schools service and health.

1.3 The service has identified all key measures through developing the business planning processes, service and team plans and it is through monitoring these alongside the new indicator set that we will make ensure that we achieve what we have set out to do.

1.4 To set the performance data for LAC and leaving care in the context of the whole remit for safeguarding, the report contains information on assessment and child protection activity as follows:

#### **Performance April 2014 – March 2015 (Provisional)**

##### **1.4.1 LAC and CP numbers**

As at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015, 355 children and young people were looked after by Ealing, decreasing from 385 at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2014. In year, 179 children and young people have become looked after and 203 have ceased to be looked after.

As at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015, 368 children and young people were subject to a child protection plan, increasing from 326 at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2014. In year, 411 new plans have been put in place and 367 plans have ceased, down from 417 and 410 respectively in the previous year.

##### **1.4.2 Timing of Children and Family Assessments (CFAs) assessments**

Ealing Children Services have been making strong progress to ensure all Children and Family assessments (CFA) are completed on time.

Performance at the end of March 2015 shows 83.40% of assessments have been completed within timescales of 45 days, which has already surpassed the annual target of 68%. This is good performance following our year end performance of 66.60% reported at the end of March 2014.

### **1.4.3 Re registrations of C&YP to child protection plans**

Ealing's provisional performance at end of March 2015 was reported at 17.3%, which shows that from a total of 411 CP registrations occurred between April 2014 to March 2015, 71 of those were re-registrations. It must be noted that some re-registrations are essential in order to keep the child safe and from harm.

1.5 There are several key measures for looked after children (LAC) and safeguarding and they are as follows:

#### **Performance April 2014 – March 2015 (Provisional)**

##### **1.5.1 Percentage of looked after children adopted during the year who were placed for adoption**

This measures the effectiveness of an important part of the adoption process and timescales. In particular, when placing children for adoption, the timeliness in which they are adopted will be affected by how easy or difficult it is to find an adoptive placement. Good performance is represented by a high percentage.

In the 12 months to end of March 2015, 70% of children were adopted within the 12 months of being placed for adoption. During this period, 10 children were adopted. Of those, 7 children were placed within 12 months, while 2 children were only delayed by a month.

##### **1.5.2 Stability of placements of children looked after**

This measure looks at the stability of care that a child has experienced. A stable and well supported placement will lead to better outcomes for the child. However, there are circumstances that will warrant multiple separate placements during the year if they and others are to be kept safe. A low percentage represents good performance.

Performance for 2014/15 show 12.7% of looked after children have had three or more placements during the year. This equates to 45 children out of the 355 total looked after children population. Performance is lower than the Ealing's statistical neighbour's average of 12.9%. A lower percentage represents good performance.

##### **1.5.3 Child protection plans lasting 2 years or more.**

This measure tries to establish whether child protection (CP) plans are effective, working towards specified outcomes which should lead to the child being removed from the register within two years. Good performance is typified by a lower percentage.

At the end of March 2015, 6.3% of children have had a CP plan lasting for over 2 years. The figure is higher than the average of our statistical neighbours (5.5%) and the national average of 4.5%.

#### **1.5.4 Timeliness of looked after reviews**

Performance for 2014/15 show 97% of children looked after for 28 days or more have had their reviews completed within timescales. This translates to 328 reviews out of a possible 338 being completed on time, higher than London average of 93.3%

#### **1.5.5 Reviews of child protection cases**

Child Protection reviews are used to measure the effectiveness of the interventions provided to children who are made subject to a child protection plan. Good performance is represented by a high percentage.

Provisional performance at the end of March 2015 shows 100% of all children/young people receiving their reviews on time.

#### **1.5.6 Employment, education and training for care leavers**

Research shows that care leavers experience high levels of unemployment and are at risk of homelessness and social exclusion. The monitoring of whether care leavers are in Education, Employment or Training (EET) is used to show the performance of local authorities in improving outcomes for young people leaving care, so that they are enabled to achieve, to make a positive contribution and to be offered the opportunity to secure their future economic well-being. A high score would represent good outcomes for young people.

In the 2014/15 year, Ealing had 214 young people who turned 19, 20 and 21 years of age. Of these, 132 were in EET to give Ealing a performance of 62%. This is above the statistical neighbours' (54.9%) and the national (45%) average.

## **2. Other Implications**

### **2.1 Risk Management**

The service has in place a risk register linked to the current business plan and priorities. The register is reviewed regularly by the senior management team and where appropriate remedial and action in mitigation are considered and agreed.

### **2.2 Community Safety**

Children's Services addresses the issue of community safety through the outcome of "Making a positive contribution"; this sets out priorities for action in respect of the key areas of youth offending and anti social behaviour.

### **2.3 Links to Strategic Objectives**

The vision will be achieved on a multi-agency basis, and key targets for delivery are set out in Ealing's Children and Young People's Plan (CYPP) refresh 2011/14. This plan reflects the Council and its partner's agenda for children and young people. Implementation is based around delivering improvements against the 5 national objectives to ensure that every child and young person in Ealing has the opportunity to:

- Be Healthy
- Stay Safe
- Enjoy and Achieve
- Make a Positive Contribution
- Achieve Economic Well-being
